

REGALIA: Indigenous Pride was a travelling exhibition by photographer Roland Lorente and writer Aline Saffore, who travelled nearly 10,000 kilometres throughout Eastern Canada to attend over twenty powwows. The exhibition is the result of their time spent photographing and interviewing dancers at each powwow.

Twenty-two vibrant photographs capture the movement and beauty of powwow dances, and through personal stories, visitors hear directly from dancers about the significance of powwows and their regalia.

The exhibit was also complemented by a display of historic beadwork and works from the following Indigenous artists:

- Beadwork by Naomi Smith
- Regalia by Diane Smoke-Thomas and Giniw (Graham) Paradis
- Short film, *Homage to Four in Paris* by Shelly Niro spotlighting Barry Ace's performance art *A Reparative Act*

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Leadership Message

The Peel Art Gallery, Museum and Archives (PAMA) enriches the Peel region by safeguarding, sharing and promoting arts and heritage across Brampton, Caledon and Mississauga. PAMA exists to share the stories of Peel by providing diverse opportunities for creative exploration and discussion to help build cohesive communities. "Nothing About Us, Without Us" — our guiding principle — ensures direct participation of communities represented in our programming and exhibitions.

This *Year in Review* highlights an exciting year of reopening and welcoming visitors back to our spaces in person. In 2022, our commitment to partnerships and diversity, equity and inclusion remained strong and focused.

As part of Alzheimer's Awareness month in January, we kicked off the year with a stunning virtual exhibition called *Life is beautiful: Memoirs of people living with dementia*, in partnership with Peel Region's Long Term Care division. The exhibition was extremely well received, with over 10,000 views in its opening month.

In February, PAMA reopened the Art Gallery and Courthouse and showcased the new exhibition *Power Play: Hockey in Contemporary Art*, curated by Jaclyn Meloche.

The *Expressions Art Competition* launched in May in partnership with Peel Public Health. We invited artists to share their COVID-19 experiences through their works. A juried panel selected the top 10 submissions from each of the adult and youth categories. The public then voted on these selections to name the top three in each category. Many thanks to all the artists who submitted work and members of the public who voted. You can find the winners on the Community Artists page of the PAMA website.

In June, we kicked off the CanadaHelps campaign for the creation of Creative Care Packages for Peel. This year the kits were created for residents in Peel Region's Long Term Care facilities and participants in its Adult Day Services programs. The total donations helped to create 85 kits.

The launch of two new exhibitions made for a very exciting summer season. *Peter Powning: A Retrospective* featured beautiful pottery and ceramics from this legendary New Brunswick artist. *Regalia: Indigenous Pride* presented stunning photographs celebrating powwow dancers from across Canada, and also displayed beaded works created locally.

We welcomed many families on-site during *Family Staycation* activities (July and August) and met community members as we visited festivals and events across the Peel region, bringing PAMA activities to them.

During the fall, we were thrilled to open two Museum exhibitions: *We Are Hockey*, on loan from the South Asian Studies Institute at the University of Fraser Valley (British Columbia), which showcased history and diversity in Canada's most beloved sport, and *UN/COVERINGS: Mennonite & Muslim Women's Heads and Hearts*, on loan from the Region of Waterloo Museums.

In the fall, we also showcased works by Brampton-born abstract artist Russna Kaur in an outdoor banner exhibition curated by Renée van der Avoird in partnership with the Brampton Arts Organization (BAO). In November, we opened *Facing Claude Cahun and Marcelle Moore*, an exhibition curated by Michelle Gewurtz and originally developed by the Ottawa Art Gallery.

We are grateful to our many donors, members, volunteers, and community partners for their continued support, which contributed to our success in 2022. Looking ahead, we are bringing an exciting new vision to our Museum in 2023, with the first refresh of its core exhibitions since 2012. PAMA will continue to address issues that are important to the community, as the team works towards strengthening engagement with both new and returning visitors.

Archives Program

For the Regional Archives, 2022 was a critical year of transition, as we undertook several large projects. One of the most important was the successful wrap-up of a future needs study that will guide expansion of the archival program for several years. Despite being closed to the public for a construction project that involved our entire collection being stored off-site, the Archives team maintained a remarkable level of service.

In September, responsibility for the archival program was transferred to the Clerk's Division at Peel Region. This administrative shift will allow the Archives to strengthen its core business function as a government archival repository.

Over the year, the Regional Archives responded to more than **1,700 COMPLEX** inquiries: an **increase of 600** from 2021.

Accomplishments

- Completed a future needs assessment, with TCI Management Consultants, that includes a plan to address the archival program's current and long-term staffing, and processing and collection storage requirements.
- Returned a large component of our archival collection from a temporary location to its home storage facility, following construction of a new, state-of-the-art climate control system. The remainder of the collection will be moved in winter 2023.
- Replaced an older shelving system in one of the collections vaults with a new, high-efficiency storage solution.
- Received positive national media coverage and drew public engagement, following the repatriation of a Standing Bear letter and handcoloured sketch of the Sundance Ceremony from our collection to the Oglala Lakota College, Woksape Tipi Archives and Tribal Repository in Kyle, South Dakota.

Collections Highlights

Archives

Continuing to enhance its stewardship role, the Archives team accepted approximately 40 new acquisitions in 2022.

Selected Government Records

The Archives collects municipal archival records from Peel Region and the municipalities of Mississauga, Brampton and Caledon. In 2022, we accepted 180 boxes of these records. They document a variety of subjects, including Regional services marketing, municipal sewer planning, Regional landfill site negotiations, and Regional COVID-19 vaccination clinic operations.

We took in 100 bankers boxes containing records from the Peel Region's marketing and design team. Dating from the 1970s to 2019, topics span everything from emergency response (SARS and meningitis outbreaks) to mailbox leaflets. The records provide an overview of nearly every program offered by Peel Region — from initiatives for those experiencing homelessness to recycling carts.

Selected Non-Government Records

Brampton sale sign for lot #51 (Model 618) "The Bayview", Ridgehill Manor subdivision, Brampton, [ca. 1962]

This sign sat on the lawn of 1 Alderway Avenue in Brampton's Ridgehill Manor neighbourhood. Max and Lois Rice formed the Rice Construction Company in 1950 in Toronto, building initially in the Downsview area. They expanded to Brampton to build Eldomar Heights (late-1950s) and Brampton Mall (1960).

Mississauga South Peel Hospital election advertisement, 1955

The South Peel Hospital Board published this advertising blotter while fundraising for a new hospital. In 1955, local voters were asked if they supported construction being financed by government debentures. Electors voted Yes, and the hospital opened in 1958 as the South Peel Hospital. It was eventually renamed the Mississauga Hospital/Trillium Health Partners.


The Toronto Grey and Bruce Railway owned this double-ended locomotive, *the Caledon*, which was used in northern Peel County between 1872 and 1881. The photo was provided from the collection of Thomas Steiger of Ohio and was donated in memory of the R.T. Walker family of Dearborn, Michigan.



The Art Gallery processed several new acquisitions in 2022, all by living female artists, for its permanent collection.

Four works that were featured in our *Power Play: Hockey in Contemporary Art* exhibition were donated by artists Liz Pead, Liss Platt and Cyndra MacDowall. Such donations are a testimony to the new relationships that are often forged between PAMA and community artists following a successful working experience.

As we continue to grow and diversify our collection of works on paper, in 2022 we purchased three drawings by prominent Inuit artists Ningiukulu Teevee and Shuvinai Ashoona. Funds for these acquisitions came from the David Somers Works on Paper Endowment. Our Art Gallery team optimized storage for **494 works of art**, including **467 works on paper** and **27 Inuit dolls.**



Museum

Throughout 2022, the ongoing construction work in the Museum's collection storage spaces continued to limit our capacity for acquisitions. A collections moratorium remains in place until the storage areas are returned to their normal functions over the next two years. We have made exceptions in cases when collections were under threat of erasure or were outstanding from previous years.

A donation of objects from the Egan family of Bolton has increased our Museum holdings representing the Caledon area.

Object transfers from the Ontario Police College and Peel Region's Treasury Services will help us share the story of the Peel County Jail and the formation of the region.

The Museum partnered with 19 community organizations

that lent objects for display across **3 exhibitions.**

While significant upgrades were applied to PAMA's heritage buildings in 2022, Museum collections staff kept busy behind the scenes, preparing for the return of the collections in early 2023. Following upgrades to the heating, cooling and ventilation system, installation of a new, high-density shelving system that maximizes our capacity for safe storage of artifacts, and installation of new fire prevention and climate control systems, the team looks forward to the gradual return of its artifacts.






The Museum acquired **78 high-density**

Learning and Community Connections

During 2022, PAMA's Community Engagement team embraced "Outreach" as their word of the year. With PAMA's partial reopening, the team connected with several community partners to offer new and innovative programs and workshops.

Programs

Although school programming wasn't offered on-site, outreach requests steadily increased throughout the year. Our team shared programming with 900+ students at schools across the Peel region.

A first-time partnership with Cawthra Park Secondary School led to a PAMA Arts and Culture Professionals Panel Discussion in February. PAMA's Community Engagement team worked with **900+ students** in Peel schools, presented **54 Creative Expressions workshops**

at 9 schools, reached

170 seniors with the Museum Memories program, and offered another 11 virtual and 54 on-site activities and events.

Creative Expressions

With the ongoing support of a Brampton and Caledon Community Foundation grant, PAMA led *Creative Expressions* art workshops in 9 schools, for a total of 54 sessions. These workshops encourage adults and children with developmental and/or physical challenges to channel their own creativity.

Public Programs

After a successful soft opening on Family Day, PAMA fully resumed on-site programming in April. We participated in the Downtown Brampton BIA Easter Egg Hunt, which brought hundreds of families through our doors, with many participating in an instructor-led family fun activity.

In May, a significant number of visitors attended an in-person Mother's Day flowermaking activity organized by our newly formed (2021) Youth Council. The Council's efforts throughout the year have been commended by MP Sonia Sidhu.

Our summer offerings on-site included *Go with the Flow Thursdays* and *Family Staycation* drop-ins. Under the theme of "Mystery," through games and interactives, we invited visitors to put on their metaphorical detective hats and problem-solve. Those who gave the correct answers in the weekly Activity Passports earned an entry to win end-of-the-summer prizes. With other on-site offerings, plus our virtual ones, our programs encompassed tea tasting, forest bathing, art workshops, music with the Brampton Folk Club, and *Connections: Art + Book Club* with the Brampton Library. Responding to the interests of the community further afield, PAMA's Community Engagement team attended movie nights, festivals and fairs, connecting arts and culture with these activities.

Seniors' programming has been instrumental in connecting PAMA to our residents aged 65+. Our *Museum Memories* workshop helps to stimulate memories and conversations, while our *Young at Heart* workshop offers hands-on opportunities that challenge the sensory skills through art. Working with Peel Region's Long Term Care centres and private organizations, PAMA's experienced educators were able to unleash the creativity of 170 registrants over the year.
